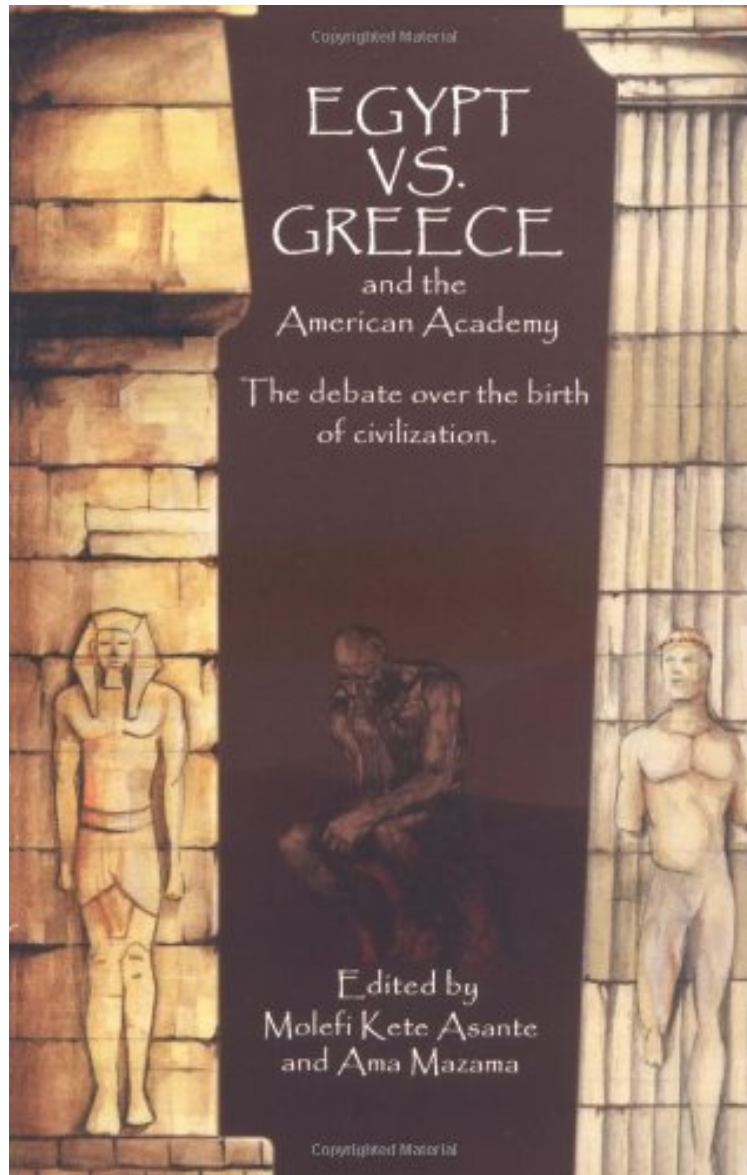

Of course the reader must be aware that the author is coming from a strong premise that one country did the scholarship and another took credit for it. It does not leave room for acculturation or building on the cultures of surrounding nations. So, as long as one is aware of the point of view the book offers interesting historical facts.
