The discovery of these texts at the end of the 19th century revealed a wealth of information about Jewish Mediterranean society in the 11th and 12th centuries, much of which has been made available in a number of scholarly works. Here, a series of carefully researched and well-written essays by leading scholars examine not only the geniza but also the original archaeology, the subsequent restoration of the synagogue, and the relation between the synagogue and the surrounding community. That last section, for example, covers the relationship in five essays from earliest times to the present. The drawings and photographs found throughout the text are beautifully reproduced and bear directly on the text. All essays are supported by endnotes (though footnotes would have been more convenient). This is a volume for every serious art and history library.

Cairo's Ben Ezra Synagogue, for a millennium the site of Jewish worship, dates back to around 950, the probable date of its probable original foundations, though the present structure was rebuilt in 1892. The synagogue is best known for its Geniza, an archive that contained 200,000 fragments of vellum, parchment, and paper documents that form an important source for the medieval history of the Mediterranean. They constitute a collection of discarded religious and secular texts, including manuscript fragments of the Bible, the Talmud, and miscellaneous correspondence. The Fortress of Babylon (site of the synagogue), known today as Old Cairo, is still defined by its Roman walls and towers, though it is now partly buried or demolished. This opulent book, with 45 color and 160 black-and-white photographs and countless architectural drawings, is the story of the restoration of the synagogue from January 1988, to Aug. 1991.
