6 of 7 people found the following review helpful. Poorly editedBy old hippoThis is an important historical work from the nineteenth century. Unfortunately this Kindle edition is very poorly edited. Apparently it was scanned and OCR'd without any effort to correct the OCR errors, which are plentiful. Many of these errors are, of course, easily spotted, and offer no hindrance to the book's use because the reader will automatically know how to correct them. However, there are many other pitfalls that may not be apparent. For instance, a reader who does not recall the dates of Elizabeth I's reign might easily be deceived into believing that "[t]he first importation of slaves from Africa by the English was in 1502, in the reign of Elizabeth." The date in the original is 1562. Modern scholarship places the date of the first importation a few years earlier, but that is a different issue altogether.The elaborate and very helpful table of contents is not linked to the contents of the book. The only way to go to a desired section after finding it in the table of contents is to do a word search.Nevertheless, this edition is useful if you do not like to read a book of this length on-line.
